About the Conductors

JaRod Hall is a Texas-native educator, performer, and composer. He holds a bachelor's degree in music education from the University of North Texas and he is currently the director of bands at Hobby Middle School in San Antonio, Texas.



As one of the country's up and coming composers, JaRod's works appear on the Texas Prescribed Music List, The J.W. Pepper "Editor's Choice" list, and the Bandworld Top 100 list. Hall is one of eight founding members of the Nu Black Vanguard, a composers collective dedicated to the promotion and advancement of Black composers in the medium of music.

Joseph Parisi is a Curator's Professor at the UMKC Conservatory where he conducts the Conservatory Wind Ensemble and serves as a conducting and music education faculty member. Parisi is recognized globally for his work as a clinician, conductor, performing artist, pedagogue, and scholar. As Parisi embarks on his 20th year at the UMKC Conservatory, he continues collaborating with renowned artists, commissioning new pieces for wind ensemble, chamber winds, symphonic brass, and soloists.



Parisi is the principal conductor of Summit Brass at the Rafael Méndez Brass Institute and the Fountain City Brass Band, and it is through his work with these ensembles that Parisi is recognized as one of the country's leading conductors. Fountain City Brass Band currently leads the United States as one of the world's top brass bands and is currently ranked as the 15th best brass band in the world, the highest-ranked American Band in history.

Dr. Parisi completed a bachelor's degree in music education at the State University of New York at Potsdam (Crane School of Music); a master's degree in trumpet performance and a Ph.D. in instrumental conducting/music education, both from Florida State University.

RED BAND PROGRAM NOTES

Fanfare for the 16th Empire, Randall Standridge: This concert fanfare evokes images of a lost empire full of kings, warriors, armies, and adventurous terrain. Standridge features the percussion section at the introduction and interlude. This piece also builds technical facility as our young musicians learn how to play and execute sixteenth notes in a large group setting.

El Capitan March, Sousa, arr. Bullock: Composed in 1896, this march was in Sousa's most successful operettas, *El Capitan*. This march was played on the warship Olympia on its way to attack Manila during the Spanish-American war and at Admiral Drewey's victory parade in New York in 1899.

Skydive, Chris Bernotas: Get ready for the thrill of a lifetime! Take a deep breath as you musically take that first step and experience the immediate exhilaration of a free fall. As you reach terminal velocity, a peaceful legato section allows the skydiver to enjoy the panoramic beauty of the scenery. The suspense and thrills then return as you pull the ripcord and come to an exuberant and triumphant touchdown.

Rumba de la Tumba, JaRod Hall: This lively and captivating piece will transport you to a realm of playfully macabre melodies. Inspired by the film music of Danny Elfman, the piece opens with a syncopated groove in marimba and xylophone. The minor keys create hauntingly beautiful melodies, while the Latin percussion isntruments add vibrancy and liveliness to this world of playful darkness!

Legend of the Lamb, JaRod Hall: With several clever time and key signature changes, this theme-and-variations format of the classic children's song "Mary Had a Little Lamb" will keep you guessing as to where the tune is headed next! Challenging rhythms and the frequency of change in modes and key takes this simple tune through a number of fun, unexpected twists and turns!

BLUE BAND PROGRAM NOTES

Loch Lomond, JaRod Hall: The Scottish lake, Loch Lomond, is the inspiration for this popular folk tune, *The Bonnie Banks o'Loch Lomond,* or the beautiful banks of Lake Lomond. Sweeping dynamics, lush harmonies, and subtle tempo changes add to the beauty of this arrangment.

A Sousa Portrait, Robert E. Foster: This is a narrative musical tribute that tells the story of this famous composer who made such an impact to the band world. Sit back and enjoy this intriguing juxtaposition of words and familiar John Philip Sousa marches and narration.

Spit-Fire, **William Owens**: Spit-Fire was written in honor of the famed Tuskegee Airmen. This group of brave African-Americans overcame intense racial discrimination during World War II to train and fly with great distinction. Over the pulse of a military drum cadence, the work begins in a hymn-like manner. This gradually grows to a imposing statement as they prepare for battle. Sporadic percussion, boisterous brass and trombone glissandos represent the intense battle eventually roaring to a victorious finish.

Three Brazilian Folk Songs, Villa-Lobos, arr. Fenske:

This suite uses three contrasting folk songs taken from Guia Prático, a six-volume work of traditional folk songs collected by the significant Brazilian composer Heitor Villa-Lobos (1887-1959), and used for music education in Brazilian schools. The light and bouncy The Crab is marked "Allegro molto," while the slower The Little Dove Flew Away is marked "Andante, sempre legato." The raucous Spider Monkeys, marked "Allegro con vivo," concludes the suite and highlights an inventive call-and-response episode between the percussion section and hand clappers.

Letchworth Fanfare, Carrie Magan: Dedicated to the iconic trestle bridge in Letchworth State Park, *Letchworth Fanfare* captures images of glistening waterfalls, bridges and trains, expansive natural beauty, and the brilliance of progress. In 2018 the iron bridge called the "Portage Viaduct" was dismantled and replaced by a new and functionally improved bridge with a steel arch design. Located in what is known as the "Grand Canyon of the East," the viaduct provides passage for train traffic 240 feet above the Upper Falls of the stunning Genesee River Gorge in Letchworth State Park. The old trestle bridge, which was built within a span of less than three months in 1875, lasted a remarkable 143 years and became an area hallmark for residents and visitors.
